In addition to honoring Delta Mu Delta for its Scholarship Program (see the story below, right), the Association of College Honor Societies (ACHS) singled out five individuals who have contributed greatly to the success of the Society. The five Delta Mu Delta Honorees include:

Five individuals recognized for DMD service

Walter F. Rohrs, Vice President of Delta Mu Delta from 1971 until 1977, and served as Co-Chair of the Advisory Board since 1977. Dr. Rohrs (see picture at right) was inducted into the Bucknell University Chapter of Delta Mu Delta in 1938 as a student, and has been involved in the Society ever since. He has served as the Faculty Adviser or Co-Adviser at Wagner College since 1970, and has continued to work to improve Delta Mu Delta.

A.J. Foranocce, President of Delta Mu Delta from 1983 until his death in 1994. He served as Professor Emeritus of Accounting in the School of Management, New York Institute of Technology, and served the Alpha Xi Chapter of Delta Mu Delta from its installation in 1971 until 1994. His frequent and direct contact with students was his opportunity to stress the ideals he believed in, including the value of scholarship.

In 1983, Prof. Foranocce was elected President of Delta Mu Delta, pledging to continue to bring expansion and growth to the Society. In his recognition of the

Randall M. McLeod, president of Delta Mu Delta, said the Society is very proud of this recognition.

“Our Society’s main purpose is to provide recognition to the top business and management students at the collegiate level,” he said. “I can’t think of a better way to reward a student’s past academic accomplishments than to help lay a foundation for even greater successes in the future. All the Delta Mu Delta members who have contributed to the Society’s Scholarship Fund deserve our thanks, as well as our congratulations, for this tremendous honor.”

potential role of Delta Mu Delta in higher education for business and management, he was unstinting in his efforts to build a better and stronger Delta Mu Delta.

Anthony J. Jablonsky, Delta Mu Delta President from 1966 until 1980. Mr. Jablonsky, a strong supporter of the honor society movement, has a longtime affiliation with the DePaul Chapter, where he served as faculty adviser from 1960 to 1982. He was instrumental in developing the affiliation between Delta Mu Delta and the Association of Collegiate Business Schools and Programs (ACBSP) in

1992. He has served as Chair or Co-Chair of the Society's Advisory Board for much of the time since 1980. Mr. Jablonsky was also instrumental in the development of the Federation of Business Honor Societies and serves on its governing body.

Mildred R. Marion, President of Delta Mu Delta from 1962 until 1967, and Executive Secretary from 1969 until her death in 1996. Mrs. Marion dedicated a major part of her life to recognizing outstanding academic achievements of business students through her long service to Delta Mu Delta. Originally associated with the Society through her induction into Delta Mu Delta at Northwestern University in 1950, Mrs. Marion was the driving force behind Delta Mu Delta's admission into the Association of College Honor Societies in 1963.

She served as the Society's official representative to ACHS for 23 years, from 1963-1996.

Robert L. McCall, President of Delta Mu Delta from 1995 until 1998, and served as Faculty Adviser of the chapter at Athens State University. Professor McCall has been instrumental in developing new programming to encourage and reward chapters for their efforts in enhancing the meaning of scholastic recognition. The Athens State University Chapter of Delta Mu Delta named a scholarship after him in recognition of his leadership.

Past and Present Collide as Athens State University Named 1999 Anthony J. Jablonsky Outstanding Chapter

In a decision that unites the colorful history and successful future of Delta Mu Delta, the Society announced the selection of the Alpha Iota Chapter at Athens State University as its 1999 Anthony J. Jablonsky Outstanding Chapter.

The Anthony J. Jablonsky Award is named in honor of the former national president and past chair of the Advisory Board who has actively supported Delta Mu Delta for more than 30 years. To add a bit of romance to the story, it is interesting to note that the then-national president of Delta Mu Delta, Anthony J. Jablonsky, installed the Alpha Iota Chapter at Athens State in 1970 (see the picture above right).

Robert L. McCall, Immediate Past President of Delta Mu Delta, presented the award during a faculty/staff meeting on the Athens State University campus. In addition to the plaque presented during the ceremony, it was announced that the name of the local chapter and the date of the award presentation would be inscribed on a master plaque at the National Chapter office. Also, it was announced that the registration fees for chapter delegates from Athens State University would be waived for the next national meeting, scheduled for Nashville in 2001.

In his remarks at the ceremony, McCall explained that the selection of the Outstanding Chapter Award was a two-step process. In the first, each of the more than 180 active chapters were evaluated against national standards for chapter operation and management. Those chapters meeting or exceeding national standards were then designated as Star Chapters. Due to the demanding selection standards, only 10 of the chapters earned this designation.

In the second step, the 10 Star Chapters competed for the Society's highest chapter honor, the Jablonsky Outstanding Chapter Award. Star Chapters were asked to submit additional materials in support of their nomination. A panel of judges then determined that the Alpha Iota Chapter

had not only exceeded national standards, but had also created additional outstanding programs to provide service to members. Chapter members were recognized for their creative approach to furthering chapter growth, development and visibility.

McCall commended the University, Dean James Haynes, Chapter Adviser Linda Shonesy and the officers of the Athens State Chapter for their dedication to scholarship and support of the purposes of Delta Mu Delta.

Awarded annually, Athens State University received the second Anthony J. Jablonsky Outstanding Chapter Award. The chapter at Elizabethtown College received the 1998 award.
