

## 2001 Delta Mu Delta Triennial Meeting

### Building Networks

With the theme of “**Building Networks**”, the 2001 Delta Mu Delta Triennial Meeting was a huge success Nov. 2-4 at the beautiful Sheraton Nashville Downtown Hotel.

Students, faculty and alumni members took part in the Triennial. Among the many activities that drew attention were the four outstanding speakers (see story on page 3). On the lighter side, many participants toured the Gaylord Entertainment Center – home of the National Hockey League’s Nashville Predators – and danced the night away on Friday evening as the disk jockeys spun a variety of tunes.

The Silent Auction, which was a very popular feature during the 1998 Triennial Meeting, was once again a huge success. Thanks to those who brought items, and those who bid and bought them, the Silent Auction brought in more than \$400 for the scholarship fund.

The Delta Mu Delta Triennial Meeting has always been a good time to look back, and then look ahead. It’s a time to appreciate the collective

accomplishments of an honor society that traces its history back nearly 90 years. At the same time, however, it’s also the perfect time to look ahead – both as a group and as individual members.

The 2001 meeting was opened with a welcoming address from Kelvin Jones, special assistant to the mayor of Nashville. Four different speakers focused on how students should look to the future. With each speaker emphasizing his particular area of expertise, they provided members with valuable information about the business world in the 21<sup>st</sup> century. The following is a short synopsis of the material covered by the Triennial speakers:

**Tim Moore**, Area Sales Manager for Dell Computer Corporation, Nashville. Mr. Moore encouraged students to take their talents and accomplishments as

outstanding students into the working world during his presentation, “Technology and the ‘New World of Work’: What the New College Graduate Can Expect”. He reminded the DMD members in attendance that many people learn the skills necessary to solve a particular problem, but not everyone can learn to be a problem-solver in general. A good problem-solver is a valuable asset to the organization, regardless of his or her assigned position.

Moore used the tremendous growth and success stories of Dell Computer’s rise to the top of their industry. He said the company’s made-to-order products and unique distribution arrangements made their success possible. He also emphasized Dell’s determination to be adaptable to consumer demands by

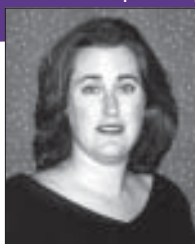

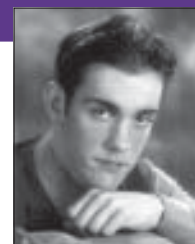

As the first two-time recipient of the Anthony J. Jablonsky Outstanding Chapter Award, the Delta Mu Delta chapter at Athens State University has certainly gone above and beyond the ordinary in representing the spirit of the Society. The award is named in honor of the former national president and past chair of the Advisory Board who has actively supported Delta Mu Delta for more than 30 years. As one of his duties as national president at the time, Anthony Jablonsky installed the Alpha Iota Chapter at Athens State University in 1970.

A special "congratulations" goes out to the student officers and other members of the chapters at Athens State University and Tarleton State University for doing their parts in making these chapters truly outstanding. In addition, the faculty advisers must also be thanked and congratulated. Prof. Dana Carpenter has held the faculty adviser position at Athens State University since 2000 and has carried on a tradition of excellence. At Tarleton State University, Janis Petronis has served as faculty adviser since the chapter's installation in 1996. Dr. Petronis was elected Vice President of Delta Mu Delta during the Triennial.

In addition to the Outstanding Chapters, several others were recognized as Star Chapters by Delta Mu Delta at the Triennial Meeting. # Scholarships

Parents would naturally be proud to find out their son or daughter had been chosen for a prestigious national scholarship. But imagine the joy the Wystepeks must have felt when they learned their twin sons, Christopher and Daniel, had each been selected as 2001 Delta Mu Delta Scholarship recipients.

“My mom called me the day that we received the (scholarship notification) letter and I was soooo surprised!” Chris said. “Receiving a national scholarship is tough to do and I really didn’t think I was going to get it. I was even more excited when I found out that my brother and Danny Serra, another Western New England College student, had also received awards.

“I was very thankful.”

As it does annually, the Society awarded 39 scholarships worth \$27,750 to business students at Delta Mu Delta schools. The scholarships, which range from \$500 to \$2,000, help students reach their academic goals. This is especially true of twins with three older siblings enrolled in college when they entered as freshmen.

“The scholarship allowed me to continue with college and pay for things I needed for school,” Chris said. “I would like to thank my parents because without them, I would not have been able to come here. They sacrificed a lot for both of us to attend school.”

twins, they must have planned similar paths, right? Not necessarily, they said.

“Growing up, people always thought that we did things together,” Dan said. “Even though it may have looked like that, we actually would go in two different directions that would lead us to the same place. I always want to be looked at as an individual and not someone who has to do the same things as my brother.”

In fact, the twins did not plan to go to the same school when they first looked into colleges. They had planned to go separately, but “tagged along with each other to see each other’s schools,” Dan said. When they visited Western New England College, he said they both fell in love with the campus. When the school offered them and their family the best financial package, they decided to go together.

“We decided to live separate from each other on campus and have different roommates,” Chris said. He said the school has been great for both of them because “they treat us like two separate people and not brothers. Yes, we have the same major and similar interests, but that doesn’t make us any different than other people.”

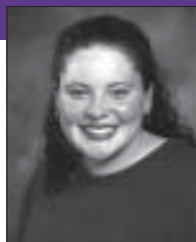

tapping into the market for economical, pre-built computer systems. Each of these successes can be attributed to the role of problem-solvers throughout the organization.

**Stan Lowery** recently moved into the home management/contracting business after 10 successful years



in the human resource field. Lowery observed and emphasized during "Human Resources – Personnel Practices in the 'New World of Work': What New Employees Can Expect", that the role of the human resource manager has changed significantly. The human resource manager previously acted as a gatekeeper for entry into an organization; now the position has evolved into a true human resource developer. Helping employees reach their full potential – both for their personal/professional growth and the company's benefit – can be a win-win situation for both, and can help reduce the turnover

of the most valuable employees. In other words, according to Lowery, the more interest a company shows in the development of its strongest employees, the more likely those employees are to stay loyal to the organization.

**Philip Hutcheson** is a Nashville area native, graduate of Lipscomb University and a former professional basketball player. He discussed "Some Things Never Change: A Description and Discussion of Important Do's and Don'ts of the Application and Interview Process". He now works in marketing, business development and project management for his family's 60-year-old paving business. He encouraged students to look for those unique talents within themselves that would help create opportunities in the professional world. Hutcheson reminded the audience that you are always marketing something – yourself – and he encouraged students to become experts at networking to help create opportunities.



**Dr. John H. Humphreys**, Assistant Professor of Marketing, Eastern New Mexico University, was the Triennial banquet speaker. Overcoming adversity and succeeding in difficult circumstances was the theme of Dr. Humphrey's presentation. Blind in one eye since birth, Dr. Humphreys used self-deprecating humor to keep DMD students, advisers and guests mesmerized with his down-home stories of creating success from less than ideal circumstances.

A talented and successful student, athlete and businessman, Humphreys chose to re-direct his talents. In the summer of 2000, he left a highly successful business career to join the academic world. He derives a great deal of satisfaction from his new career because it provides him the opportunity to teach and mentor students and business people in the areas of leadership, culture, change and personal development.

# Scenes from the DMD Triennial Meeting

## Past and Present Join in Nashville



**History of Delta Mu Delta**  
*Updated from the Orientation Address delivered by Anthony J. Jablonsky during the 1995 Triennial Meeting*

Delta Mu Delta was founded on November 18, 1913, some 88 years ago. Five professors from Harvard, Yale and New York University founded our Society; these men believed that exceptional students in the field of business should be given recognition similar to that by Phi Beta Kappa in the field of liberal arts.

The first chapter was installed at New York University on January 16, 1914. The Gray Booklet of Information, which was composed for that occasion, has been used since that date. It is still identical in size and appearance to the original.



On July 1, 1951, members of six active chapters met to discuss the establishment of a central organization through incorporation to standardize procedures, control the issuance of certificates and keys, formulate the Bylaws and assist the chapters. On August 12, 1952, a corporate charter was granted under the laws of Pennsylvania.

In 1963, Delta Mu Delta was admitted to membership in the Association of College Honor Societies (ACHS). From that point on, the Society has experienced steady and sound growth. Membership in ACHS assures all chapters and their members that Delta Mu Delta meets the highest standards set by all of the member societies in all fields of learning.



In October 1989, a dialogue commenced between the Society and the new accrediting organization ACBSP, the Association of Collegiate Business Schools and Programs. It became evident that there were many benefits to be realized by Delta Mu Delta and ACBSP forming an affiliation. In January 1992, they entered into an agreement whereby Delta Mu Delta would establish new chapters only at ACBSP accredited schools. The agreement also provided that existing Delta Mu Delta chapters would continue as members of our Society whether they became accredited by ACBSP or not.

Since the governing agreement in January 1992, chapters have been installed at 85 schools. At present our Society has 191 active chapters and more than 100,000 members.
